Final Report 2001-2002

This year's Envirothon was very exciting and challenging as Manitoba partnered with North Dakota to deliver a joint Envirothon competition at the International Peace Garden.

The first step in the Envirothon process was to prepare binders of information and supplementary materials to be distributed to those schools registered for the program. Mike James undertook this time consuming work with the co-operation of members of the various committees and special assistance from Dr. Alex Salki and Dr. Kent Simmons. The four basic binders included forests, soil, aquatics and wildlife, with the fifth binder covering the special environmental topic: "Biodiversity – The Effects of Introduced Species".

Meetings of the Manitoba volunteer steering committee were scheduled at regular intervals throughout the fall and winter, increasing in number as the provincial competition approached. This committee and several sub-committees were responsible for all aspects of the competition.

This included:

- working with John McQueen, Director, International Peace Garden to organize accommodation and use of other facilities, as well as sites for the trail testing and orals competition;
- working with Selma Maendel, in charge of food services;
- finding volunteers to prepare for and deliver the event; and
- writing the trail tests, and the Orals question.

At the helm for Manitoba were Jim Potton, Chair and Mike James, Coordinator. In addition to the Manitoba meetings, there were joint meetings with the North Dakota steering committee. These were generally held at the Peace Garden so committee members had an opportunity to view the facilities and make their plans accordingly.


The co-operation of many individuals was invaluable in making possible this undertaking. Twenty-one Manitoba teams participated in the competition. The teams involved were: Arthur Meighen High School, Portage la Prairie; College Jeanne Sauve, Winnipeg; Crocus Plains Regional Secondary School, Brandon; Edward Schreyer School, Beausejour; Fairholme School, Portage la Prairie; Fort Richmond Collegiate, Winnipeg; Gimli High School, Gimli; Glenway School, Glenway; Grant Park High School, Winnipeg; Lac du Bonnet Senior School, Lac du Bonnet; Lord Selkirk Regional Secondary School, Selkirk; W. C. Miller Collegiate, Altona; Morris School, Morris; Northwest Soil Management Board, Swan Valley; Shaftesbury High School, Winnipeg; Silverwinds School, Sperling; Stonewall Collegiate, Stonewall; Swan Valley Regional Secondary School, Swan River; Vincent Massey Collegiate, Winnipeg; Vincent Massey High School, Brandon; and Windsor Park Collegiate, Winnipeg. The Pembina Valley Conservation District Environmental Club from Manitou registered for the program, but unfortunately was not able to compete.

Pre-Competition Workshop

Mike James and Eric Uhmann planned and facilitated a full day of activities at Oak Hammock Marsh on Friday, April 19th through the co-operation of Michele Kading and staff at the Interpretive Centre. A copy of the schedule forms part of this report. The presentations by experts in the various fields were designed to help the Envirothon students prepare for the competition in May.

Provincial Competition

Thursday, May 30th – Registration for the Provincial Competition took place on Thursday, May 30th in the dining hall at the International Peace Garden for teams and in Howard Hall for volunteers. Registration boxes had been pre-packaged for the teams and this made registration much more efficient, given the number of students and teachers (37 teams in total) who had to register. T-shirts, nametags, souvenir pins from the Peace Garden and mugs (donated by Manitoba Hydro and Sustainable Development) were distributed to the teachers, students and volunteers. Mike James assigned rooms during registration.

Once the teams were registered they gathered in the Masonic Auditorium for the evening program. Light refreshments were provided through donations secured by Diane Olson from North Dakota.

Glenda Fauske (ND) and Jim Potton (Mb.) co-chaired the proceedings, which included an official welcome and brief remarks by Dr. Clarence Bina, State Department of Public Instruction and Assistant to Dr. Wayne Sanstad, State Superintendent. Diane Olson (ND) and Mike James (Mb.) introduced the teams; Andrea Swain spoke about recycling activities for the next two days, and Glenn Peterson spoke about the trail testing. Pierre Bottineau entertained the group with his environmental stories, and the evening ended with an ice-breaker (paper) snowball fight. Glenn Peterson held a briefing session for those trail captains and guides who were already on site.

<u>Friday, May 31st</u> – Following breakfast everyone boarded buses to proceed to the trailhead where a brief equipment training session took place for the teams. The trail captains and guides participated in a short orientation session with Glenn Peterson.

Several members of the media visited the trail site during the morning and early afternoon, including a reporter and cameraman from CKX-TV, Brandon, and a reporter and photographer from the Boissevain Recorder.

While the trail testing was underway, teachers participated in an Information Sharing Workshop facilitated by Diane Olson and Mike James. This is always a valuable session for the teachers, particularly those who are new to the program, and for the MFA as we are always looking for new and better ways to achieve our objectives.

Everyone gathered together shortly after noon at the trailhead for lunch prepared and served by Fairholme Colony. Andrea Swain looked after recycling.

Trail testing continued after lunch, while teachers participated in a workshop on the 2003 environmental theme (Agriculture), with guest speakers Wayne Hildebrand, Manitoba Intergovernmental Affairs, Gladstone, Jennifer Hagglund, Assistant State Conservationist, Natural Resources Conservation Service, US Department of Agriculture and Terry Volk, County Weed Board Specialist, ND Department of Agriculture. A brief overview of Maryland 2003 was provided by Craig Zinter, Canon Envirothon. Teachers were given the opportunity to tour the test trails through the co-operation of Glenn Peterson, Laureen Janusz, Barry Oswald, David Hay, Richard Lee, the trail captains and some of the trail guides.

The teams returned to the dining hall for dinner and then assembled in the Burdick Centre for an evening emceed by Brendan Carruthers, which included a talk on Biodiversity by Dr. Kent Simmons. Special guests representing Canon Envirothon were introduced and said a few words. These included Craig Zinter, Maryland, Chair of Canon Envirothon; Clay Burns, Mississippi, Executive Director, Canon Envirothon, and Debbie Totten, Nova Scotia Forestry Association and Canadian member-at-large, Canon Envirothon. Norm and Janet Hammond, Rhode Island volunteered throughout the event.

The more formal part of the evening was followed by a trading session, games, socializing, dancing and outdoor activities.

A briefing for Orals facilitators, monitors and runners who were available was held in Howard Hall Friday evening.

<u>Saturday</u>, <u>June 1st</u> - Following breakfast, teams met in the Masonic Auditorium where Mike James instructed them on preparation and presentation of their orals. Due to the number of teams presenting Orals this year, preparation time was limited to approximately 1½ hours.


Manitoba teachers gathered with Glenn Peterson, David Hay and Barry Oswald to review the trail tests and to discuss any aspects of the program which were creating difficulty. As always, worthwhile suggestions came out of this session.

Judges were greeted and addressed by Jim Potton and Michele Kading. Dr. Kent Simmons gave a short presentation on the special issue, his previous Envirothon experiences and what to look for when judging a team.

The first round of Oral Presentations began at 10:30 a.m. with 7 teams presenting at a time. Presentations continued until noon and resumed at 1 p.m. Presentations were 10 minutes with an additional 5 minutes for questions from the judges. Teachers were allowed to observe only their own team.

Once the preliminary judging was completed everyone moved to the Burdick Centre at 3 p.m. Brendan Carruthers was emcee. While waiting for the results of the preliminaries, some of the prizes were distributed. Glenda Fauske and Jim Collins, Jr. distributed the North Dakota awards. Glenn Peterson facilitated the Manitoba Awards, which were given out by a number of people representing the various disciplines. At 3:10 p.m. the six finalists (3 from ND and 3 from Mb.) were announced. The North Dakota teams were: Kenmare Public School, Sargent Central High School and West Fargo High School Packers, and the Manitoba teams were: Fairholme Colony, Northwest Soil Management Board and Swan Valley Regional Secondary School. These six then presented Orals for the second time before a common set of judges which included Clay Burns, Tom Gibson, Bob Laidler, Barry Waito and Craig Zinter.

The teams placed as follows: **North Dakota**: West Fargo High School 1st, Sargent Central High School 2nd and Kenmare Public School 3rd; **Manitoba**: Swan Valley Regional Secondary School, Swan River 1st, Northwest Soil Management Board, Swan Valley 2nd and Fairholme Colony School 3rd. Swan Valley Regional Secondary School will represent Manitoba at the Canon Envirothon in Amherst, Massachussetts from July 29th to August 4th. "Tree trophies" were presented to the Manitoba winning team. Second and third place teams received medallions. Many other prizes were given to recognize teams for excellence in trail testing, etc. Barry Waito, President, Canadian Forestry Association and Debbie Totten, Nova Scotia Forestry Association and the Canadian representative on Canon Envirothon presented medallions to the team from Fort Richmond Collegiate, Winnipeg which had achieved the highest score in forestry.



Winnipeg, Manitoba – 185 students representing 37 teams from across North Dakota and Manitoba will be putting their knowledge of the environment and environmental issues to the test at the joint North Dakota/Manitoba Envirothon Competition May 30th to June 1st being held at the International Peace Garden.

"The Envirothon challenges students on their environmental knowledge, understanding, and problem solving skills relating to forests, soils, wildlife, aquatics, and current issues topic using real-life situations" says Jim Potton, chair of the Manitoba Envirothon Committee. "It involves the students in a hands-on practical learning experience where they must work as a team".

Field testing will take place Friday May 30th with oral presentations on Saturday June 1st. Both North Dakota and Manitoba will declare their champion at the awards ceremony Saturday afternoon and these teams will go on to represent their state/province at the 2002 Canon Envirothon in Massachusetts this August.
