


FINAL REPORT 2003-2004

The first step in the Envirothon process is always to prepare binders of information and supplementary materials to be distributed to those schools registered for the program. Mike James was contracted to prepare the current topic binder on "Natural Resource Management in an Urban Environment" and compiled an overwhelming amount of information. Under the direction of Glenn Peterson, volunteers from the Test Writing Committee partnered with Envirothon teachers to revise the four annual binders, i.e. forestry, soil, aquatics and wildlife.

Meetings of the Manitoba volunteer steering committee were scheduled at regular intervals throughout the fall and winter, increasing in number as the provincial competition approached. In total, eight meetings were held. The steering committee and several sub-committees were responsible for all aspects of the competition.

The co-operation of many individuals was invaluable in making possible this undertaking. Included in this list are our partners and sponsors, contributors of services and prizes, the teachers and students who enthusiastically participated, and the volunteers which numbered over 70.

Pre-Competition Workshop

Mike James and Eric Uhmann planned and facilitated a full day of activities at the Freshwater Institute, University of Manitoba, Winnipeg on Friday, March 19th. A copy of the agenda forms part of this report. The presentations by experts on the various fields were designed to help the Envirothon students prepare for the competition in May. In addition, a mini field test was undertaken by the students through a greenhouse and several of the labs at the University. Representatives from all twenty-seven teams participated in the day of activities.

Provincial Competition

A draft handbook that addressed various Manitoba Envirothon policies, guidelines and practices was prepared, and although utilized for the 2004 competition, comments were requested from committee members, volunteers and participants. This will be modified based upon the comments provided and will be used as a guide for all future competitions.

Thursday, May 13th

There were several false starts due to a fairly major snowstorm that hit southern Manitoba. Members of the Steering Committee traveling from Winnipeg tried alternate routes to reach Brandon, with some waiting until the TransCanada Highway re-opened at 10:30 a.m. Thursday morning.

Registration for the teams took place beginning about 4 p.m. at Brandon University. Because of the delay caused by the storm, registration boxes had to be pre-packaged by volunteers for the teams once everyone was able to reach the University. T-shirts, name tags and mugs (donated by Manitoba Hydro) were distributed to the teachers, students and volunteers.

The trail test committee, after a late start due to the snow, set up the test trails Two trails with 14 test stops on each trail were established. With the support of the City of Brandon Parks Staff, the trails were cleared of snow to assure ready and dry access for the students and volunteers.

Teams and volunteers gathered in the Brandon University main diningroom for dinner and the evening program. A welcome was extended by Brandon University representatives, and there was acknowledgment of the role volunteers play in making the event possible. Teams introduced themselves through song or a skit, and participated in a trading session.

An orientation session for those working on the trails the next day, i.e. captains, guides and station attendants was provided at 8 p.m.

Friday, May 14th

After breakfast at the University everyone boarded buses for the short drive to the Riverbank Discovery Centre. Each team was linked with a volunteer trail guide, and a brief training session took place for the students and teachers. There were two designated trails (Assiniboine and Brandon) at the Discovery Centre, and despite the cold, snow and wet conditions, the students persevered and completed their trail test.

Through contact with the Wheat City Golf Course, two golf carts were donated for the day. One was used to carry a handicapped student around the test trails and the other was utilized to ferry equipment and supplies and was made available to the media for quick access.

During the morning the teachers were taken on a tour of the Brandon generating station. Everyone returned to the Discovery Centre for a bag lunch prepared and delivered by the University. Teachers were given the opportunity to tour one of the trails during the noon break.

Trail testing continued after lunch. Mike James organized a workshop for teachers to discuss the theme for 2005 which is Preserving Cultural Landscapes. Following a short introduction, there was a general discussion and a question and answer period.

Teachers were given the opportunity to tour the second trail as soon as the students had finished their test.

Everyone then boarded buses to travel to the Vincent Massey High School where they enjoyed a wonderful dinner prepared by the Fairholme Colony. Originally planed to take place at the Discovery Centre this was another change necessitated by the snow.

The evening program, with Dennis Windsor as emcee, included a presentation by Beth Sanders and David Kattenburg on *Resource Management in an Urban Environment*, the 2004 theme. This was followed by Karaoke for those students who wished to participate.



Team Work is Essential for Success

Saturday, May 15th

Following breakfast at the university, teams received instruction from Mike James about the Orals preparation and presentation and were assigned individual rooms where they could prepare.

Teachers gathered with Laureen Janusz, David Hay, Glenn Peterson and Barry Oswald to review the trail tests. As always, very worthwhile suggestions came out of this session.

Judges were greeted and addressed by Dennis Windsor and Michele Kading. Beth Sanders and Dave Kattenburg presented a shortened version of the Friday presentation on the topic **Resource Management in an Urban Environment.**

Following lunch at the university, the first round of Oral Presentations began at 1 p.m. with 7 teams presenting at a time. Presentations continued until 3 p.m. Presentations were 10 minutes with an additional 5 minutes for questions from the judges. Teachers were allowed to observe only their own team.



Once the preliminary judging was completed everyone moved to Theatre A for 3:30 p.m. John Sinclair facilitated the final oral presentations. The teams who had placed in the top four positions (Fairholme Colony School, Fort Richmond Collegiate, Vincent Massey Collegiate, Winnipeg, and Swan Valley Regional Secondary School) were announced. While the first of the four teams prepared to present their Orals, team prizes were distributed.

The four finalists presented their final orals to a panel of 7 judges. The Swan Valley Regional Secondary School team will represent Manitoba at the Canon Envirothon in West Virginia in July. "Tree trophies" were presented to the Manitoba winning team. Second and third place teams received medallions. Other prizes were given to recognize teams for excellence in trail testing, and other categories including climate change.


